

LEVI "Joined"

When Leah gave birth to her third son, she said, "now this time will my husband be joined unto me, because I have borne him three sons: therefore was his name called Levi," or "Joined.", Gen.29:34. Little did Leah, in the longing for love of her husband realize that the little babe would fulfill its name in a far broader sense that she anticipated, and help to join the children of Israel to their great Husband, the Creator of all things. Isa. 54:5

The name of Levi seemed a prophecy of the life work of the whole tribe. As Satan, through envy and jealously, separated Leah from her husband's regard, so he sought to ruin Levi by persuading him to unite with Simeon in avenging the wrong done to their only sister.

The words of Jacob on his deathbed reveal the magnitude of the crime and how the Lord regarded it. The old father's heart was stirred at the remembrance, and he exclaimed, "O my soul, come not thou into their secret; Unto their assembly, mine honor, be not thou united... Cursed be their anger, for it was fierce; and scatter them in Israel." It was more like a curse than a blessing; but when a sinner repents and turns from his sins, our God turns even curses into blessings, and thus it was in the case of Levi. Neh. 13:2

There is nothing to indicate that the tribe of Levi had any special pre-eminence over the other tribes during the Egyptian bondage. It is quite evident that the original plans of having the first-born officiate as priest of the household, continued until the encampment at Sinai. The "young men of the children of Israel" offered the sacrifices at the time. Exodus 24:5. In the Targum Pseudao-Jonathan, it is expressly stated, "He sent the first-born of the children of Israel, for even to that time the worship was by the first-born because the tabernacle was not yet made, not the priesthood given to Aaron."

Character is formed by the way individuals meet the common events of every-day life; but it is tested by the way they meet the crisis in life. At Sinai the people of God passed through one of the greatest crises in the history of the church, when the whole multitude of Israel worshipped the golden calf. It was at this time, when even God himself was ready to destroy Israel, Exodus 32:10, that the tribe of Levi came forward, and by their faithfulness helped to save the cause of God.

When Moses came down from the mount and found the children of Israel worshipping the golden calf, he stood in the gate of the camp, and said, "Who is on the Lord's side? Let him come unto me. And all the sons of Levi gathered themselves together unto him. And he said unto them, thus saith the Lord God of Israel, put every his sword by his side, and go in and out from gate to gate throughout the camp, and slay every man his neighbor. And the children of Levi did according to the word of Moses." Exodus 32:26-28

At the time of this crisis the honor of God and His cause was dearer to the Levites than all worldly connections; neither brothers, companions, nor friends, stood between them and their duty to God. As a reward to their faithfulness, the priesthood- a portion of the birthright- was given to the sons of Levi. What Ruben lost by his unfaithfulness in his father's home, Levi gained by being true to God before all of Israel.



Jacob on his deathbed denounced Levi's sin; but Moses in his parting blessing, extolled him above all others. Of Levi he said: "Let thy Thummim and thy Urim be with thy holy one, whom thou didst prove at Massah, and with whom thou didst strive at the waters of Meribah; who said unto his father and to his mother, I have not seen him; neither did he acknowledge his brethren, nor knew his own children: for they have observed thy word and kept thy covenant. They shall teach Jacob Thy judgment, and Israel Thy Law: they shall put incense before thee, and whole burnt sacrifice upon thine altar. Bless, Lord, his substance, and accept the work of his hands." Deut. 33:8-11

From the fall, man, each household had celebrated its worship with a priest of its own. When the time came to change this method of worship, God did it in a way that gave all Israel a thorough understanding of the matter. The firstborn males of all Israel were numbered. and found to be 22,000. Then the tribe of Levi was numbered, and there were 22,273. Thus the Levites outnumbered the first-born; so the redemption price for the first-born – "five shekels apiece by the poll," was paid for the 273 Levites-the number by which they outnumbered the first-born. Num. 3: 46-49. Then all the Levites were set apart for their life-work.

The sum of the numbers given in the third chapter of Numbers for each of the three branches of the tribe of Levi is 22,300. It is understood that these extra 300 were the first-born of Levi, and as such were already consecrated,

and could not take the place of others.

The tabernacle was a sign to the children of Israel of their unseen King, and the Levites were as a royal guard that waited exclusively upon Him. When the people were encamped, the Levites were the guardians of the sacred tent. When they traveled, the Levites alone carried all that pertained to the sanctuary.

When Israel entered the Promised

Land, the tribe of Levi was given no inheritance. It was not expected that they would spend their time and strength in cultivating the soil and rearing cattle. The spiritual welfare of all Israel was to be their burden; and, that they might the more easily perform this work, the Levites were given fortyeight cities, scattered throughout all the twelve tribes, and the tithe was used for their support. Num. 18: 20-21. Thus Jacob's prophecy was fulfilled; they were "divided in Jacob, and scattered in Israel."

The history of the temple and its service is a history of the Levites. When God was honored by His People, the Levites were given their appointed work; but when apostasy

came in, the Levites were obliged to seek other employment for their support. Neh. 13: 10-11

Levi, like the other tribes, had a checkered history; not all were true to God, but the tribe continues to exist in Israel to the time of Christ, and had a worthy representative among the early apostles in the person of Barnabas. Acts. 4: 36

It was in the time of a crisis that the Levites gained their great victory. In a

crisis decisions are made quickly. Many fail at such time, because they do not have independent Christian characters. They are in the habit of following the leading of those in whom they have confidence, and they have no strength in themselves. He who would always prove true in the crises of life, must have a clear connection with the God of Heaven, and must fear God more than man. "Satan is marshaling his hosts. Are



you prepared for the conflict just before us? Are you preparing your children for the crisis? Are your children forming habits of decision, that they may be firm to principle? Parental duty has been sadly neglected. Will you not now repent, and take up your God-given lifework? There is no time to lose. Redeem the time, because the days are evil. Pray that your spiritual perceptions may be quickened. Strive to realize the importance of living in obedience to The Holy Spirit. When you do this, the heavenly angels will minister to you as teachers in the home, training you for the work of teaching your children." RH, September 15, 1904 par. 15

Moses and Aaron are two of the most noted characters in the tribe of Levi. There was a marked contrast in the two men. Moses stood like a great rock, against which the waves beat continually.

> Aaron was gentler, and at times he seemed almost vacillating; but Aaron was a strong character, although different from his brother.

Aaron's crowning test came when his two sons were smitten down in the tabernacle. Because, under the influence of strong drink, they offered strange fire before the Lord, Aaron was not allowed to show any signs of grief; thus teaching the people that God was just in punishing evildoers, even if they were his own sons.

This was no small test, and after studying Lev. 10: 1-11 we can better understand how, notwithstanding the murders committed in Levi's early life, the Lord could speak of Aaron as

"the saint of the Lord." PS.106: 16

One twelfth of the one hundred fortyfour thousand will be marshaled under the name of Levi. They will be persons who, on account of sin, merited only curses, but who forsook sin; and while men all around them were wavering and falling, they stood true to God and His cause, and will receive a rich blessing from the hands of a merciful God. May all those who belong to that tribe be receiving God's blessings. *AMEN*.

Satan has so many devices by which he seeks to distract anyone from God. He is constantly trying to make up new distractions by which he can lead people astray. What exactly are the instruments of Satan?

In this article I am going to cover some of the things that can be and are used by Satan as distractions.

Books & Stories

The world is deluged with books that might better be consumed than circulated. Books on sensational topics, published and circulated as a moneymaking scheme, might better never be read by the youth. There is a satanic fascination in such books. . . . {AH 412.3}

The practice of story reading is one of the means employed by Satan to destroy souls. It produces a false, unhealthy excitement, fevers the imagination, unfits the mind for usefulness, and disqualifies it for any spiritual exercise. It weans the soul from prayer and from the love of spiritual things. {Adventist Home p.412}

This is a very effective method through which Satan has had a lot of success already. Far too many people are drawn in by exciting stories, novels, and lots more. This is a very dangerous ground because it is very addictive. Once you have started reading these type of books other – more sensible – books lose their attraction for us. Even the Bible will begin to seem boring or uninteresting. Because the Bible and the testimonies

will seem dull, we will find it very hard to realize where we have gone wrong because we will no longer be reading anything that might be beneficial to us. Another thing connected with reading that doesn't do any good is speedreading. (see Adventist Home p.451) If speed-reading is made a habit – and it will if it is done often- it makes us almost incapable of reading slower, and properly absorbing what we have read. I used to speed-read very often and I know how quickly it is possible to make a habit of it. And it is quite hard to slow down to a normal speed. I have managed to slow down my reading but still find it hard at times to stay that wav.

Theatres

Among the most dangerous resorts for pleasure is the theater. Instead of being a school for morality and virtue, as is so often claimed, it is the very hotbed of immorality. Vicious habits and sinful propensities are strengthened and confirmed by these entertainments. Low songs, lewd gestures, expressions, and attitudes deprave the imagination and debase the morals. Every youth who habitually attends such exhibitions will be corrupted in principle. There is no influence in our land more powerful to poison the imagination, to destroy religious impressions, and to blunt the relish for the tranquil pleasures and sober realities of life than theatrical amusements. The love for these scenes increases with every indulgence as the desire for intoxicating drink strengthens with its use. The only safe course is to shun the theatre, the circus, and every other questionable place of amusement. {Adventist Home p.516}

Dancing & Card Playing and More...

In many religious families dancing and card playing are made a parlor pastime. It is urged that these are quiet home amusements, which may be safely enjoyed under the parental eye. But a love for these exciting pleasures is thus cultivated, and that which was considered harmless at home will not long be regarded dangerous abroad. It is yet to be ascertained that there is any good to be obtained from these amusements. They do not give vigor to the body nor rest to the mind. They do



not implant in the soul one virtuous or holy sentiment. On the contrary, they destroy all relish for serious thought and for religious services. It is true that there is a wide contrast between the better class of select parties and the promiscuous and degraded assemblies of the low dance house. Yet all are steps in the path of dissipation. {AH 516.3}

Satan has invented many ways in which to squander the means which God has given. Card playing, betting, gambling, horse racing, and theatrical performances are all of his own inventing, and he has led men to carry forward these amusements as zealously as though they were winning for themselves the precious boon of eternal life. Men lay out immense sums in following these forbidden pleasures; and the result is, their God-given power, which has been purchased by the blood of the Son of God, is degraded and corrupted. The physical, moral, and mental powers which are given to men of God, and which belong to Christ, are zealously used in serving Satan, and in turning men from righteousness and holiness. {Counsels on Stewardship p.134}

There are many more devices of Satan than we are even aware of. He will use anything at all that will serve to distract us from the word of God. Reading, Theatres, Card Playing, Gambling, and worldly music are just a few of the main tools that he uses for his evil work. Anything that will not serve to bring us closer to Christ should be examined very carefully.


A spirit of jesting and joking, of lightness and trifling, is not only a stumbling-block to sinners, but a worse stumbling-block to those who thus give way to the inclination of an unsanctified heart. The fact that some have allowed this trait to develop and strengthen until jesting is as natural as their breath, does not lessen its evil effects. When any one can point to one trifling word spoken by our Lord, or to any lightness seen in his character, he may feel that lightness and jesting are excusable in himself. This spirit is unchristian; for to be a Christian is to be Christ-like. Jesus is a perfect pattern, and we must imitate his example. A Christian is the highest type of man, a representative of Christ. {Gospel Workers 1892 edition p.416}

It was by deception that Satan seduced angels; thus he has in all ages carried forward his work among men, and he will continue this policy to the last. Should he openly profess to be warring against God and His law, men would beware; but he disguises himself, and mixes truth with error. The most dangerous falsehoods are those that are mingled with truth. It is thus that errors are received that captivate and ruin the soul. By this means Satan carries the world with him. But a day is coming when his triumph will be forever ended. {Patriarchs and Prophets p.338}

Satan has a lot of experience in deceiving people. He has been doing it for 6000 years. He knows every trick and trap that is possible to imagine. He knows full well that if he would bring bold and unconcealed temptations men

would soon see through his cunning devices, and would not fall for anything he has devised. But he mixes lots of truth with a little error and so deceives billions. Let us hope and pray that we will have the wisdom to notice his temptations, and the strength of character to withstand them. *Amen*

Satan had warred for the mastery in heaven, and had lost the battle, (1SM, 222). No longer free to stir up rebellion in heaven, Satan's enmity against God found a new field in plotting the ruin of the human race. (PP, 52). It was the tempter's purpose to thwart the divine plan in man's creation, and fill the earth with woe and desolation. And he would point to all this evil as the result of God's work in creating man. (SC, 17)

Ever since his fall, Satan has worked by means of deception, (MB, 31). The discord which his own course had caused in heaven, Satan charged upon the law and government of God. (GC, 498). He claimed that angels needed no law; but should be left free to follow their own will, which would ever guide them right; that law was a restriction of their liberty, and to abolish law was one great object of his standing as he did, (1SP, 23). Thus he deceived angels. Thus he deceived men. (DA, 22). Behold the world today in open rebellion against God. (PK, 185).

Now the way seemed open for Satan to establish an independent kingdom, and defy the authority of God and His Son. (PP, 331).

Not only is Satan leading the world captive, but his deceptions are leavening the professed churches of our Lord Jesus Christ. (COL, 414). Many even of those who claim to be Christians have allied themselves with influences that are unalterably opposed to God and His truth. (PK, 177). They cannot see that such company is calculated to do them harm; and all the time assimilating to the world in character, words, and actions, they are becoming more and more blinded. (GC, 508). They are

stupefied by the spirit of the world, (4T, 43). They are corrupted by the world and discern it not. They talk of the love of God, but their fruits show not the love they express. They rob Him in tithes and offerings, and the withering curse of God is upon them. (2T, 197).

Ye adulterers and adulteresses know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? Whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God. (James 4:4). Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, and will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be My sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty. (2 Corinthians 6:17, 18).

Man came from the hand of God perfect in every faculty of mind and body; in perfect soundness, therefore in perfect health, (4T, 29). His nature was in harmony with the will of God. (PP, 45). When man transgressed the divine law, his nature became evil, and he was in harmony, and not at variance, with Satan. (GC, 505). Every emotion, every impulse and imagination, was at war with the divine principles of purity and peace and love. (PP, 79). His nature became so weakened through transgression that it was impossible for him, in his own strength, to resist the power of evil. (SC, 17).

Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness? (Romans 6:16). The disciple is not above his master; but every one that is perfect shall be as his master. (Luke 6:40).

When man became Satan's captive, the dominion which he held, passed to his conqueror. Thus Satan became "the god of this world." 2 Corinthians 4:4. (PP, 67). Through transgression the sons of men became the subjects of Satan. (4T, 563). He was made captive by Satan, and would have remained so forever had not God specially interposed. (SC, 17). The mission of Christ was to rescue him from the power of his great adversary. (1T, 341). This could not be done by force. (DA, 22). Earthly governments prevail by physical force; they maintain their dominion by war; but the founder of the new kingdom is the Prince of Peace. (COL, 77). Wisdom and strength He could command, but the means He employed with which to overcome evil were the wisdom and strength of love. (2T. 135, 136).

For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: not by works, lest any man should boast. (Ephesians 2:8, 9). Grace is an attribute shown to undeserving human beings. We did not seek after it; it was sent in search of us. (TM, 519) *Amen.*

SORROW-HOW TO USE IT! PSALM 38:4

"For my iniquities are gone over mine head; like an heavy burden they are too heavy for me."

"The walls of the world's sorrow is heard all around us." (COL 417). "Sorrow comes to all, and awaits Christians all along the way to heaven." (MH 247; 4BC 1146). In fact, real life on this earth has its sorrow. "We see many careworn, sorrowful faces in our daily ministrations." (CH 211). "Sorrow is awaiting the world that no human balm can heal." (PK 277).

Yet, it's a characteristic, or feature of the Christian religion, that sorrows and misfortunes are not the lightning and thunder of an angry God, but the fatherly (paternal) corrections of a Father chastening His children.

The ancient Greeks, it is true, understood the beneficent effects of affliction in shaping and developing character, and their "proverb", "pathemata, mathemata", gives us a perfect translation in that verse, "knowledge, by suffering entereth."

But, they, the Greeks then always ascribed the causes of calamity to the direful wrath of their god, Zeus; the chief of the Olympian gods, god of the elements; the thunderbolt is his sign and the rainbow his messenger; also, Zeus was their god of moral law and order.

The old Jewish theology seemed to be moved and vitalized by the same spirit. Longer life, respect and honour, wealth and wisdom are promised to the righteous, while sudden death and every worldly woe are threatened (or fall on), against the ungodly. Thus, with Jew and Greek, earthly good, doing good is the (touchstone) criterion or test for divine approval or favour. But it was left for a new generation of believers that followed, that a divine lesson in teaching mankind, that their "light affliction which is but for a moment, worketh out for them a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory." (2 Cor. 4:17).

Sorrow and suffering are, by all the teachings of the Gospel, divine in their origin, holy in their ministry, beneficial in their results. But, how could sorrow and suffering do this?! This torturing grief, sadness, trouble, affliction, anguish, woe, misery... the pain of mind caused by deep disappointment in life... a fruitful longing for something that's not here or there?? This ever-present distress, misfortune, mourning, wretchedness!? We shall see, for "there is no sorrow, as a result of these, for which God has not provided a remedy." (MH 249). How, then can we use it?

SORROW AND SUFFERING PURIFIES

We need their "purifying" influence to make us one with Christ. They change... supernaturally change our life, reconcile us (bring us back in harmony), to duty. They cause the soul to slough off or discard earthly affections; the beginning of that mysterious process by which mortality shall put on immortality.

SORROW AND SUFFERING HUMANIZES

It makes us human. By nature man is selfish and unsympathizing. His first impulse is to care for self-alone... ego. It is not until his mind and heart have been influenced by grace or interest, that he yields his personal self and claims. In order to sympathize with someone else fully, or another person, you must have had personal experiences yourself. You might as well expect a picture of a gorgeous summer sunset from a blind man, or Bach's symphonies or Luther's hymns from a mute, as true sympathy in affliction from one who never knew sorrow or grief. Sorrow, however, "softens and subdues men." (4T 143).

SORROW AND SUFFERING "CHRISTIANIZED" US

Often before this rich experience, Christ is a root out of dry ground, without form or comeliness; the Bible, a mere collection of old tales, or fables; heaven and Sheol, words of very doubtful significance; while this great present world fills our vision and receives all our attention.

How this all changes by a simple touch of God's finger! Christ then becomes the chiefest among ten thousand, clothed with every beauty and grace; the word of God is made the lamp unto our feet; the future life becomes real, and the present life a dream, a story tale.

A few years ago two friends were visiting Niagara Falls, the majestic waterfall of the Niagara River, between New York and Ontario, Canada. While there, one went out on a frail, narrow bridge that connects Goat Island with the Tower Rock, where the torrent falls fearfully down. There he stood on the edge of life, gazing spell-bound into the jaws of death, ready to receive him! Deafened by the incessant roar, half blinded by the spray, rainbows flashing out like evil hands beckoning him to leap into the raging waters, his brain suddenly began to whirl, his mind and sense grew dim, and his body slowly moved to and fro over the yawning gulf!

His friend from the shore saw his peril. He

shouted to him in vain; his voice swallowed up in the rush of the tremendous cataract. He jumped onto the frail bridge, seized his friend by the arm, and the dazed man was saved from certain death.

There is another human soul, also, somewhere, like this friend at Niagara Falls, standing "unconsciously" on the brink or edge of ruin and disaster. Around him are the rushing torrents of life. He has still a foothold on the rock of early religious teachings, or perhaps a pious mother's saving prayers, but his spiritual senses are deadened by the ceaseless roar and rushing of the world. He is warned of his danger; friends entreat earnestly, and appeal to him, beg him, God even calls him... three times! (Job 33:14); but, the still small voice is not heard in the tumult, surging, swelling, uproar. The minds and feelings are agitated. When suddenly, for the safety and salvation of the soul God comes along and touches him-it may be in the tenderest, weakest point—but, who shall say that it's nothing but-love.

SORROW AND SUFFERING SANCTIFIES

It sanctifies us. It is by that "spiritual culture"; refinement, development, improvement of mind, by which Christ makes a branch, already fruitful that brings forth more fruit; a process by which we are made holy unto the Lord. And oh; for that poor crushed child of affliction, sorrowing, suffering here today, while in the Gethsemane of sorrow, you ask, "why this bitter cup"... and no answer comes. Remember, that which you don't know now, or understand now, you will one day know in the "hereafter," when the tumultuous falls are quieted.

You will then find, as you look back on your sorrowing and suffering journeys and pilgrimages of life experiences; that these places which seemed like the "valleys of the shadow of death," (Ps. 23:4) in the glorious light of retrospect, in looking back are the very mountain tops of God's providence, where you were nearer to heaven than at any other period in your journey.

Yes, where the anguishing shadows of the Almighty God fell the darkest and saddest on you, according to the Psalmist you were dwelling in the "secret places of the Most High." (Ps. 91:1)... in "Heavenly Places"— Our Exalted Privilege (Eph. 2:4-6). And then, finally...

SORROW AND SUFFERING GLORIFIES

We shall soon be glorified. Although we can expect sorrow, suffering, and tribulation in this present age (John 16:33; Acts 14:22), we will come out of the great tribulation. (Rev. 7:14-17). "There will be no sorrow in the new earth and the world to come and no wail of sorrow in the New Jerusalem." (MB 365; Ed 303; 9T 287). *AMEN*

Complaining

Most of the people are dissatisfied with something in their lives, therefore they complain. People complain about their friends, neighbours, relatives and even of their husbands and wives because they do not live up to their expectations. People complain about their jobs; their income is not high enough. People complain about their health which they themselves have ruined by their wrong People complain about the habits. churches they are attending. They complain about the other members in the churches. This list of complaints could go on endlessly. All the complainers and miserable and unhappy. And besides this they make others miserable by spreading their dissatisfaction around.

The first question is what do we gain by complaining? And the next one is do we have a right to complain? And finally, can we have the Comforter, the Holy Spirit, and still complain about our hardships?

The first question is easy to answer. We gain nothing by complaining, but we can lose much. The old Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron and therefore they could not enter into the Promised Land.

"And all the children of Israel murmured against Moses and against Aaron: and the whole congregation said unto them, would God that we had died in the land





of Egypt! Or would God we had died in this wilderness!" Num. 14:2.

"Say unto them, As truly as I live, saith the Lord, as ye had spoken in mine ears, so will I do to you: your carcasses shall fall in this wilderness; and all that were numbered of you accordingly to your whole number, from twenty years old and upward, which have murmured against Me." Num. 14:28,29.

"Brother and Sister B, you have a work to do for yourselves which no one can do for you. You are inclined to murmur and complain. You have something to do to subdue your natural feelings. Live for God yourselves, knowing that you have not to answer for the wrongs of others. I saw, Brother B, that you would certainly be overcome by Satan, and make utter shipwreck of faith, unless you stop your faultfinding and seek pure and undefiled religion before God." Test. Vol. 2, p. 221.

"God has shown me that He gave His people a bitter cup to drink, to purify and cleanse them. It is bitter draught, and they can make it still more bitter by murmuring, complaining, and repining." EW, p. 47.

Complaining will not alleviate our sorrow. It will not increase our faith and trust in God, but rather weakens our faith. Those who listens to our complaints will not benefit from it either, but it will take away their joy and peace and fill their minds with bitterness.

The next question was, do we have a

right to complain? Is it possible that someone may suffer injustice, while being innocent? The Bible gives a simple and clear answer to it. "The wages of sin is Death." Rom. 6:23. We all have committed sins and therefore we all deserve death. This would be justice, but we are not receiving justice, but mercy. Sinners have life and hope of eternal life even. The recipients of mercy have no right to complain. Our heavenly Father has to discipline and chastise His children because He loves them. "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten." Rev. 3:19.

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are the called according to His purpose." Rom. 8:28.

Jesus did not promise to His followers an easy life, but tribulations, trials, persecutions, and a martyr's death.


If we complain about the leading and chastening of God, He will leave us alone to go on our own way, which means to perish.

The early Christians had to suffer much yet without complaint. "Under the fiercest persecution these witnesses for Jesus kept their faith unsullied. Though deprived of every comfort, shut away from the light of the sun, making their home in the dark but friendly bosom of the earth, they uttered no complaint. With words of faith, patience, and hope they encouraged one another to endure privation and distress." GC, p. 41.

Sister White wrote of herself, "Much of the time my body is full of pain, but I will not by complaining become unworthy of the name of Christian." SM 2, p. 238.

By hardships and affliction we learn the lesson of patience. And patience is required for our salvation. The image of God is place in us daily through sufferings and tribulations. The stone that the artist is working on receives ten thousand hammer blows while other stones peacefully lie on the ground. God is the Master Artist shaping us to His own image. Let us never complain any more, but rather rejoice that God is working on us and has not left us to perish in our sins. *AMEN*


THE WORK IN BELIZE

Now the Lord said unto Abram, get thee out of thy country and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will show thee, and I will make of thee a great nation, and will bless thee and make thy name great and thou shall be a blessing.

The Lord had a great job for Abraham. He was to be the father of many nations and through him the whole world would be blessed. Well, I can't compare myself with Abraham, but it's sure wonderful to know that the Lord has us in mind!

Greetings dear brothers and sisters. My name is Esther Ellington and I would like to talk to you about my experience in Belize. It was great to say the least. We were visiting a very humble home in the country, close to a river here in El Salvador. We've only visited for a day, when that night about a block or so from the house, eight of the children from there and myself were worshipping on a full moon's night, when we heard a scream coming from the house. "Sister Esther, someone is looking for you, come, it is an emergency!" we all ran at once, asking ourselves what could be the matter. When we got up the hill, my heart was beating a hundred miles per hour. When I saw a group of people, I wondered what this could be all about.

We shook hands and we sat down. They began by explaining the work in Belize and the need for lay workers, and also the project of taking the tent and actually evangelizing a place that had English as their first language. Most of the lay workers were Spanish speaking brothers and sisters. Well, definitely a challenge, but that is where I come in. They said that I could help out Brother Rizo the translate the services, and also sing during the crusade. It all sounded



great but I asked, when will this take place? It

was a Thursday night. "We are leaving Tuesday of next week", he said. "A little too soon," I thought.

Brother Lopez said, "This is a puzzle, and we are trying to put it together. Sister Esther, are you willing to go?" I answered without hesitation. "Here I am, Lord, send me! You know I'll go with my children anywhere!" "But there is something you should know, sister, you can't take your children.!" "Oh boy, I have never travelled without my children," I answered. "Well, you see, sister, where we're going is no place for children, plus you won't have time to care for them." I asked the brothers if we could pray about it and ask the Lord for help. After the prayer I felt a complete peace in my heart and I answered, "if there is someone who would care for my children while I'm gone, I'll be willing to go with you." Brother Archila said, "I know your family will be willing to help out, they are always willing to work for the Lord." "Then let us go talk to them," said Brother Lopez. "But it is almost 9 o'clock," said Brother Archila. Then spoke Brother Hector, "I think you should try and if the sister is willing to go, you should go."

We gathered our stuff in a hurry and put it in Brother Archila's truck, said goodbye to the children in the h o m e and their parents, and we

were off to Santa Ana to speak with my family. My mom was very frightened to hear somone knock on the door at 12 o'clock midnight. But they all agreed to help take care of the children.

Tuesday, I was supposed to leave with the brethren for Belize that morning. I got a phone call, it was a school offering me a job! You see, I had been working on my own, giving private classes, but now I'm offered a teaching position in a school. I said to myself the Lord knows what I have need of before I ask Him, so I went to the interview, and I passed the test and got hired!

I thanked the supervisor very politely, but told her I couldn't take the job. "Why?" she asked in surprise. "You see," I explained, "I have a mission to take care of. The Lord hasd called me to go to Belize as a lay worker and I can't refuse." She looked at me right in the eyes and smiled, "Go child," she said, "and may the Lord richly bless you! And if it's God's will, the job would still be here for you when you get back!" I knew then that I had made the right decision.

Travelling to Belize was very difficult. I was sad because I was leaving my children behind, but was happy because I was obeying God's voice. We left from Guatemala about 4 o'clock in truck. We travelled almost two days and one night without stopping to sleep with all the equipment, four brothers and myself until we got to P.G. Belize the next day at about 7 at night. What a trip! We were tired and hungry. I didn't know what to expect. I was in a different country with different people, but the beauty of Belize gave me a warm feeling about the place although homesick I was glad I was finally there!

Next day we set the tent. The women did not help in the hard work, but we cheered while they worked! No, not true we were in the kitchen preparing food for almost 20 people! The days that followed were busy days, we had our work cut out for us.

Every morning we would wake up at 5:30, have morning worship and do exercise. Sometimes we would walk to the beach and there have morning worship and enjoy the sunrise, it was ever so peaceful. From 7:30-8:30 we had breakfast, then our work would be given out for the day. Some of the brethren would go do surveys in town. I had to go to the tent with Dr. Rosaura. There were free consultations and also free medicine. Lots of people would come from P.G. and the nearby villages. One of the biggest problems with the people's health was their eating habits, they consumed too much pork. And about 75% of the people were infected with worms and other diseases caused by pork eating.

Sometimes our routine would change and I would stay home cooking lunch with Sister Aury while Brother Samuel would take my place. There was little or no time for canvassing. Sometimes we would have to go give lectures on health. One of them was given at the local school to the teachers of that school. The results were great! They were very much interested in their health and later on they visited us at the tent. Most of the teachers became my friends. Some of them bought health books the same day of the lecture.

Sometimes I would go canvassing by myself and the Lord blessed me! On exciting experience I had was that I got to be in the local radio station, Wamalily Radio Station. We recorded some messages, Brother Lopez and myself. Govel Morgan, the owner was very nice and we got to be on the air a couple of times! We would invite the people to the night meetings, and also to the free consultations. The results were fantastic! Lots more people started coming.

Soon we made friends with the people of P.G. Whenever I was in the street, the people would come up to me and ask me about the tent! I would explain to them what was our mission and I would invite them and explain to them we had come to give them free medicine for the mind, soul and body!

In the afternoon, Brother Samuel, Jacobo, and Miguel would go in the tricycle and announce the meetings, while Brother Rizo, Brother Lopez and Brother Hunberto visited the people that had come to the service the night before. At 5 o'clock we all had to be at the tent inviting the people to come to the service. Brother Javier was at the keyboard while Sister Monica and Sister Aury would begin singing in Spanish, then I would start singing in English.

Our theme song was "Jesus" from the smallest child to the oldest folk, they all knew the words to the song by memory, and enjoyed singing it very loud. As soon as they heard singing the people would start coming on their bikes and others in their cars, walking and even by taxi. But they got there, the tent got full, the people couldn't fit inside, they stayed outside to hear! All around the tent looking through the windows.

The arrival of Brother Henry and

Brother Pat proved to be a blessing in P.G. To hear the message, clear in their own language was encouraging for the people. I remember one night that Brother Henry had just finished preaching and we've said goodbye to the people. The people remained in their seats, and wouldn't move. They all said as one, keep on preaching! There is no school tomorrow! The next day would be a holiday, but it was already 9 o'clock and we were all very tired.

February 17 was to be the last night that we were going to be there. Brother Rizo had already announced that it was our last night there, but since the people were so sad to see us end the service, they decided to extend it another week, since Brother Archila and Brother Eliseo had just come from El Salvador with more medicine and clothing from the Good Samaritan here in El Salvador to give to the people, and there were still more Bibles to give out. The service had to continue for the glory and honour of God! I had never seen so many people hungry for the Lord.

Sad to say I wasn't able to stay. I got very sick and was hospitalized in Sister Rosauras Hospital in Guatemala. But I do not regret one minute of the work we were able to accomplish in Belize. There are lots of people interested in the Reform Message. Brother Rizo and Brother Samuel are still working in P.G. There are souls visiting the church and receiving Bible studies. Among those is a young man named Delbert who also helped with the special music during the crusade. My sisters and brothers, the harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few.

Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into His harvest. *AMEN*.

The First Australia Wide West Coast Conference

In the providence of God, history was made for the Australian International Missionary Society. Up until the year 2001 the International Missionary Society had no representatives in West Australia. But providentially through the mighty power of prayer and God's ordained way of shaking His people, a company of 8 people was formed. At the end of that year a pioneer group of 4 traveled the continent (four day journey) to attend their first Australian IMS conference and since then more have traveled east for the year-end conference.

Much joy in fellowship has occurred between the members and new believers. Slowly a desire grew in the hearts of the West Australians that the Eastern States folk come to the West. So it was that history was made on the 17th April 2003 when the members came together for the long weekend at the Bickley Outdoor Recreation Camp, Orange Grove for the first Australia wide Western Australian Field Conference.

Some members were able to fly across the continent while the church van loaded with 9 passengers left Sydney early on Sunday morning. After traveling 48 hours, with only fuel stops they arrived very early Tuesday morning giving Br John Thiel a surprise by knocking on his door before he was even out of bed.

Consequently all but 3 members from the east were able to join us in prayer meeting 2 days before the camp began. We sensed the Lord's hand gathering us early to prepare us for the camp with the message from Lamentations. "Is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by? Behold, and see if there be any sorrow like unto my sorrow..." thus it was an indication the Lord had more in store for us than we were expecting.

The conference began with a message from the Lord not to harden our hearts but to look for the Day Star and He began by showing us how to recognize the Day Star from all the other stars around about clamoring for our attention.

We could hear the Lord speaking to us through the morning and evening worships and the prayerfully selected special items of song and poetry and I'm sure all received conviction in some form or another.

Bros. Jerry Eaton, John Thiel and Glen Higgins were used mightily of the Lord in presenting a series of studies based on 2 Peter 1:19 The Day Star Arising in Your Heart

The Friday evening study showed us how the Day Star arises out of darkness, in our blackest hour, in the darkness of our hearts the day star is there unconsciously at first but slowly arising and, providing we do not say no to Jesus, He arises brighter and brighter unto the perfect day.

The Sabbath began in a very special way. The Lord brought to us the true personal application of the birth of the Son of God. The shepherds and wise men were looking for that Special Star spoken in the prophecies and as they walked in the light of that prophecy they came to a place where they saw the glory of God in reality. We understood with new meaning how the Christmas story, so hackneyed in today's society can be an actual reality in our hearts. In consequence of this study we sang two of those special songs that are most often reserved for the festive season with new meaning and appreciation.

The Divine service emphasized the importance of defining the darkness and calling people out into His marvelous light. This is the mission of the fourth angel. To call all to "Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues."

On Sabbath afternoon the Young People's meeting also focusing on the Day Star Arising in our hearts. Sr. Ariadne gave a talk on astronomy and we learned that the heathen, although he does not know God, can know the story of salvation by studying the stars. Sr. Jodyne talked about the shooting star. We discovered that the tail of light that flows from the shooting star is its outer crust burning up as it comes into the earth's atmosphere. She likened the shooting star to the Christian that is shining because his "outer crust of self" is being burned up and purged by the truth of the word. The Christian is allowing the fire of the Holy Spirit to consume his sinful ways, causing the beauty of the love of Jesus to shine forth.

We could see the Lord tailor made in every worship and study, as each had its own unique beauty and powerful message.

The subtle seductive ways Satan uses to unconsciously creep in amongst us was exposed on Sabbath evening in the study, Sing a New Song. We praise the Lord for this, at first, seemingly offensive message, for now we are wiser and will be able to experience deeper victories in His name. Praise the Lord for His great mercy upon us in bringing these points to our attention. He is truly working for our salvation, not willing that any of us should perish.

To close off a beautiful Sabbath day many of us, especially the less tired ones, gathered round an outdoor camp fire and talked and sang under the evening stars.

Throughout the weekend we could sense the Lord working on our hearts with a two edged sword, cutting and healing as He went amongst us. In His divine intervention, He was showing us our sins, developing patience, love and forbearance amongst us and bringing us into oneness of mind with Him. What more could we ask for? This is truly the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Sunday morning was the highlight of the weekend. After a powerful study entitled The Baptism of Jesus in You, Sr. Thy (Tee) Chey publicly declared her love for the Lord and her purpose to walk the narrow road Jesus did by being baptized. She referred to this



experience as being both her funeral and birth.

Since our inception here in the West in March 2001 we have had a baptism every 6 months and Sr. Thy is the 19th West Australian member to be written in the books of Heaven.

> Our experience throughout the camp was





In my life, I have done much long distance travelling by car and the best way for me to get from one place to another is by using a road map. Even then, sometimes a wrong turn has been taken and after while I have begun to wonder where I am. Or then I thought I was on the right road, but after awhile I end up somewhere completely different than I expected and I ask myself in frustration, "What am I doing here?" It takes time to retrace my steps and get back on the right road. There are times I really thought I was on the right road, but in the end I was not.

Is this not how it happens in our Christian walk also? The wicked know that they are on the road to destruction, but what about the righteous? Are you sure you are on the right road? Solomon once said, "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof [are] the ways of death." Prov. 14:12. Are you on the road of your own choosing? Have you entered the road, asking God's help along the way without asking God's direction?

"Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates?" 2 Cor. 13:5 We are to turn a critical eye upon ourselves. Are we genuine Christians? Every follower of Christ can profitably examine his own life each day. If we would be more critical of ourselves, we would be less critical of others. We need to work together to make sure we are all on the right road, lest we discourage someone and they turn back to another road.

Where are you going? What are you doing? We need to ask this question of ourselves regularly.

Pilate: Pilate was in a position of uncertainty. He was trying to decide in his mind, which was the right road to go down. He even received a warning from God through a dream to his wife as to which was the right way. "Pilate longed to deliver Jesus. But he saw that he could not do this, and yet retain his own position and honour. Rather than lose his worldly power, he chose to

sacrifice an innocent life. How many, to escape loss or suffering, in like manner sacrifice principle. Conscience and duty point one way, and self-interest points to another. The current sets strongly in the wrong direction, and he who compromises with evil are swept away into the thick darkness of guilt.

"Pilate yielded to the demands of the mob. Rather than risk losing his position, he delivered

Jesus up to be crucified. But in spite of his precautions, the very thing he dreaded afterward came upon him. His honours were stripped from him, he was cast down from his high office, and, stung by remorse and wounded pride, not long after the crucifixion he ended his own life. So all who compromise with sin will gain only sorrow and ruin. "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." Prov. 14:12. DA 738. He had no faith in God to direct his life. He chose the wrong path and ended up exactly where he was trying to avoid ending up. God can see the end from the beginning. He knows what is at the end of the road you are travelling on and if it is not the right road, He may stop you to ask you what you are doing there.

Is that not how it is with us? We see that



maybe God is directing us one way, but we just can't see how everything will work out. We see only loss and disaster ahead. We feel we have to go another way in order to save ourselves much trouble, but in the end the trouble that we tried to avoid comes upon us. God knew the best.

The ways of death mentioned by Solomon in Proverbs are not entered into blindly or thoughtlessly. They are chosen with the assurance that they

at least seem to be proper under the circumstances. The warning is against trusting to the guidance of the conscience without checking the conscience constantly against the teaching of the Word of God. Many men have persuaded themselves that God will accept a substitute for His precise requirements, only to find that they have lost all. Pilate presents an outstanding example. While he was probably not familiar with the written word, the living Word Himself instructed him by voice and example. The governor thought that he could compromise with evil and still retain his wealth and position, but his compromise led to disgrace and death.

This is also what Jacob did. He thought he was trying to help God. He knew that the birthright was his according to the angel's promise to his mother at his birth, however he felt he had to travel the road of deception and deceit in order to bring about God's will. That ended in a 20-year separation from his father and he never saw his mother again. His way was not the right way.

Sometimes we may think we are in the right place or doing the right thing but God has to stop us and ask us what we are doing there and help us to consider which is the right way.

Elijah thought he needed some quiet meditation with God alone on Mt. Horeb, after the exhilarating experience on Mt. Carmel. But when he got there the Lord asked him, "What are you doing here Elijah?"

"God met His tried servant with the inquiry, "What doest thou here, Elijah? I sent you to the brook Cherith and afterward to the widow of Sarepta. I commissioned you to return to Israel and to stand before the idolatrous priests on Carmel, and I girded you with strength to guide the chariot of the king to the gate of Jezreel. But who sent you on this hasty flight into the wilderness? What errand have you here?" PK 168. He thought he had every right to be there because he was fleeing the presence of Queen Jezebel who was seeking his life. However that is not where God wanted him to be. God still had work for him to do and so He set Elijah on the right way.

Other times we know we are in the wrong....

Jonah was asked by God to do a duty that he found distasteful so he ran the other way. "If, when the call first came to him, Jonah had stopped to consider calmly, he might have known how foolish would be any effort on his part to escape the responsibility placed upon him. But not for long was he permitted to go on undisturbed in his mad flight." PK 267 When he was in the ship during the storm I am sure God was wondering, "What are you doing here Jonah - I sent you to Nineveh?" In humility and repentance, in the whale's belly, he turned back to the way God wanted him to go.

Adam and Eve tried to hide themselves from the presence of the Lord after they sinned. "In their innocence and holiness they had joyfully welcomed the approach of their Creator; but now they fled in terror, and sought to hide in the deepest recesses of the garden. But "the Lord God called unto Adam, and said unto him, Where art thou?" pp 57

This is so true with many when they have sinned. They try to hide from the Lord. But the "eyes of the LORD are in every place, beholding the evil and the good." Prov. 15:3. "Be sure your sin will find you out." Num. 32:23. Then the Lord will ask, "What are you doing here?" "What have you done?" Then the excuses come like it was with Adam and Eve.

We need to confess our sin when it is found out like David did. He repented bitterly of his sin with Bathsheba when Nathan the prophet revealed to him God's displeasure. God sometimes asks us other questions. He asked Cain, "Where is Abel thy brother?" Gen. 4:9 After Cain killed Abel he tried to hide from the presence of the Lord, but the Lord found him and punished him. "Again the Lord said to Cain, "What hast thou done? The voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto Me from the ground." God had given Cain an opportunity to confess his sin. He had had time to reflect. He knew the enormity of the deed he had done, and of the falsehood he had uttered to conceal it; but he was rebellious still, and sentence was no longer deferred. The divine voice that had been heard in entreaty and admonition pronounced the terrible words: "And now art thou cursed from the earth, which hath opened her mouth to receive thy brother's blood from thy hand. When thou tillest the ground, it shall not henceforth yield unto thee her strength; a fugitive and a vagabond shalt thou be in the earth."" PP 77

Other times we have no idea why we are where we are – we're just running with no direction in mind.

Hagar fled from Sarah when Sarah was being harsh on her and in the wilderness the Lord asked her, "What are you doing here Hagar?" "And he said, Hagar, Sarai's maid, whence camest thou? and whither wilt thou go? And she said, I flee from the face of my mistress Sarai." Gen.6:8 She had no idea where she was fleeing to, but God found her and gave her directions as to where she should go from that point in time.

" 'When Sarai dealt hardly with her, she fled from her face.'

She made her way to the desert, and as she rested beside a fountain, lonely and friendless, an angel of the Lord, in human form, appeared to her. Addressing her as "Hagar, Sarai's maid," to remind her of her position and her duty, he bade her, "Return to thy mistress, and submit thyself under her hands." Yet with the reproof there were mingled words of comfort. "The Lord hath heard thy affliction." "I will multiply thy seed exceedingly, that it shall not be numbered for multitude." And as a perpetual reminder of His mercy, she was bidden to call her child Ishmael, "God shall hear." PP 145/6

When we feel despondent and without hope – and we try to flee from reality, the Lord is very near. If we only turn to Him we will find the direction we are looking for.

Sometimes we want to do something good, but God says 'NO'. King David wanted to build the temple of the Lord, but God said 'no'. Why? It seemed like a good project and a very self-sacrificing one. Sometimes we want to do good things but God says 'no', because it is not according to His will. We are not the right person for the project.

"David knew that it would be an honour to his name and would bring glory to his government to perform the work that he had purposed in his heart to do, but he was ready to submit his will to the will of God. The grateful resignation thus manifested is rarely seen, even among Christians. How often do those who have passed the strength of manhood cling to the hope of accomplishing s o m e great work upon which their hearts are set, but which they are unfitted to perform! God's providence

may speak to them, as

did His prophet to David, declaring that the work, which they so much desire, is not committed to them. It is theirs to prepare the way for another to accomplish it. But instead of gratefully submitting to the divine direction, many fall back as if slighted and rejected, feeling that if they cannot do the one thing, which they desire to do, they will do nothing. Many cling with desperate energy to responsibilities which they are incapable of bearing, and vainly endeavour to accomplish a work for which they are insufficient, while that which they might do, lies neglected. And because of this lack of co-operation on their part the greater work is hindered or frustrated." PP 712/13.

"In deciding upon any course of action we are not to ask whether we can see that harm will result from it, but whether it is in keeping with the will of God." PP 634

That is why it is so important to ask G o d ' s direction in every matter of life. Everywhere we go, every project we undertake. It is better to know God's will ahead of time than make mistakes and have God come to us and ask us, "What are you doing?"

Backtracking is hard work – best to be doing God's will in the first place. What a lot of trouble would have been saved if Jonah had gone when God first asked him to go.

Has God come to you asking you, "What are you doing here?" Are you where God wants you to be?

Jesus knew perfectly well where He had come from and where He was going, but He decided to go there anyway. He could have come down from the cross, turned His back on you and I, and left us to die in our sins. But He chose to submit to the will of God and died to His fallen Human nature so that you and I could be saved. That was true submission. We need to submit ourselves to God in like manner.

> We need direction in our lives and God can give us the best direction if we ask Him to be the ruler of our lives.

> > Sometimes going where the Lord wants us to go requires a cross, but beyond the cross there is a crown to be won. May God help us each to know what God's purpose is for our lives and what direction He wants us to take, making sure we are on the right road. AMEN
