Valerie was a little girl with red hair and freckles. She always seemed to be smiling and full of courage and innocent appeal

She was about ten or twelve years old. It was hard to be sure of her age from her appearance, as her stunted, malformed frame made her look younger than she was. But her small oval face wore an expression more appropriate to a grown woman.

Her eyes were her dominant feature. Large, dark, and luminous. fringed by long thick lashes, they were her one beauty. She had the habit of gazing steadily for a long moment at a newcomer to the children's ward. If she liked what she saw, her face would light up and she would shuffle over and introduce herself.

She had a smile, the nurses said, that could light up a room – and could make you forget her misshapen body and painful, awkward movements.

She smiled often. I never saw her cry, although she had experienced a great deal of pain, rejection and disappointment. Valerie, I gathered, had already shed all her tears several years and countless operations ago.

Valerie would come to the children's surgical ward for prolonged periods. Then she would disappear, only to return within a few months for further corrective surgery – surgery that could only, at best, make life manageable for her. She had MBD - multiple birth

Valerie had a well-developed and slightly cynical sense of humour. When some unthinking visitor would ask her what was wrong with her, she would smile sweetly and suggest that he return later when he had a day off work and time to spare, "But", she would add innocently, "if you're in a hurry, I can tell you what's right with me."

Whenever she was recovering from one of her operations. Valerie would "fall" out of bed - which was the only way she could manage to get out of bed without help (and she scorned help). She would shuffle around the ward, helping to care for the other children.

The small patients liked Valerie in spite of her appearance and curious method of maneuvering. She could get them to do things even when the nurses failed.

Br. Giner said that since 9/11 the world has changed, people are looking for stability. We are scared for our future, scared for every aspect of our life. We want to enjoy peace but people fear more and more every day.

Only God can give us peace, He is the only one that can fill that void in our heart. Only God's love can fill that void, only He can bring us stability and peace.

The love of God is what must capture and change our life. We like to be loved but many cannot even understand the love of God because they are not able to love like God. We need to learn this love.

David's life was not easy; he was often fleeing for his life. But David had a friend in Jonathan, the son of his enemy.

"And he said unto him, God forbid; thou shalt not die: behold, my father will do nothing either great or small, but that he will shew it me: and why should my father hide this thing from me? it is not so." 1 Sam. 8:1, 3; 20:2.



VICTORY AND VITALITY!

Proverbs 4:25 commands, "Let your eyes be fixed ahead, your gaze be straight before you." Let your eyes look right on!" "Remember Lot's wife," warns Jesus in Luke 17:32. What did she do? Well, she looked back and was judged instantly.

The wilderness Israelites complained, looking back to Egypt, saying "Why did we ever come up out of Egypt?" (Num. 11:20). "Now the mixed multitude who were among them yielded to intense craving; so the children of Israel also wept again and said, "Who will give us meat to eat?" But now our whole being is dried up; there is nothing at all except this manna before our eyes." (Num. 11:4, 6) The Lord satisfied their desires, "But while the meat was still between their teeth, before it was chewed, the wrath of the Lord was aroused against the people and the Lord struck the people with a very great plague." (Num. 11:33)

Moreover, they refused to enter Canaan, saying, "Why has the Lord brought us to this land to fall by the sword, that our wives and children should become victims? Would it not be better for us to return to Egypt?" (Num. 14:3). They summarily rejected Canaan and in essence Jesus!

The Apostle Paul's wise testimony was, "Forgetting those things which are behind," (Phil 3:13). Ah! But he said further, "do not forget my law, but let your heart keep my commands; for length of days and long life and peace they will add to you." (Prov. 3:1) Blessed counseling, especially for the young!

So, this is the "forward look" of faith that leads to victory and yes, vitality in the Christian life... and long life! In fact, this is the way our Saviour lived while here on earth! So, shouldn't it behoove us to live likewise?

The Apostle Paul's aim was evidently to possess such intimate knowledge of his Lord, and his position in Him, that the day of judgment would be one of **approval and victory** instead of **shame and defeat.** Every effort was bent with this forward focus in view! Victory and vitality is to be our cherished goal!

RACE OF FAITH

Ah! But, can you imagine this? The disciples were looking back while the Lord was looking ahead to the cross! "Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us. Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." Heb. 12:1, 2.

The above mentioned "race" (GR - agona – a contest demanding a full expenditure of energy) is set before us. To run with full energy demands that we first lay aside every encumbrance, as a runner would strip all clothing, (in ancient Greece runners ran nude; no women were allowed at the contests); "and the sin which so easily entangles us." Running requires excellent physical condition. One type of runner was called a "hoplitodromos." That is, an "armed runner." Not only did he have to run two "stadia" (GR- stadiumequals 185 meters approximately, so they had to run about 370 meters), but he also had to carry a cumbersome bronze shield, and javelin while doing so! The winner was awarded pots filled with oil from the sacred olive trees of the goddess, Athena.

So you see, it is a "race of faith" for the disciples and us as well, without any encumbrances! Ah! But, the disciples looked back again, as a Samaritan village rejects the Savior. Because of their mixed blood and different religious customs the Jews hated them! Pilgrims to Jerusalem, however, ordinarily did not go through Samaria.

"Saul and Jonathan were lovely and pleasant in their lives, and in their death they were not divided: they were swifter than eagles, they were stronger than lions... I am distressed for thee, my brother Jonathan: very pleasant hast thou been unto me: thy love to me was wonderful, passing the love of women. How are the mighty fallen, and the weapons of war perished!" 2 Sam. 1:23, 26, 27.

David composed this song about his friendship with Jonathan. David was also compassionate and loving to Saul. He had love for his enemy, the one who wanted to destroy him.

The friendship of Jonathan helped David. Jonathan said, when you become king be good to my family and descendants. David did as he promised because of their friendship.

Br. Giner read of David's entreaty of any relatives that may be left of his dear friend Jonathan's family. When David became aware that Jonathan still had a son that was living he commanded to bring him immediately.

Mephibosheth, Jonathan's son, feared David's call but he did not know about David's covenant with his father, Jonathan. David loved Jonathan and he loved Mephibosheth because of this love.

God loves us with a much greater love than this. The love that God has towards us is beyond our understanding.

Come to my city, He is calling us today. The door of grace is still open. Just as David called Mephibosheth, God calls you. Come to His house of grace, His city of refuge. Make a decision for Him today.

Youth Program

The youth program, titled Lost And Found, explored the experience of a person and the many temptations and experiences that Satan puts in his way. Then said he unto him, A certain man made a great supper, and bade many: And sent his servant at supper time to say to them that were bidden, Come; for all things are now ready. And they all with one consent began to make excuse. The first said unto him, I have bought a piece of ground, and I must needs go and see it: I pray thee have me excused. And another said, I have bought five voke of oxen, and I go to prove them: I pray thee have me excused And another said, I have married a wife, and therefore I cannot come. So that servant came, and shewed his Lord these things. Then the Master of the house being angry said to his servant. Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in hither the poor, and the maimed, and the halt, and the blind. And the servant said, Lord, it is done as thou hast commanded, and yet there is room. And the lord said unto the servant, Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that My house

may be filled. For I say unto you, That none of those men which were bidden shall taste of My supper."

None of these excuses made sense. Any excuse we make to God does not make sense.

Jesus then says to compel other men to come in to the supper. That means that we must compel sinners to Christ! God loves sinners but not sin. We need to turn away from sin in our lives. God says, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." But, the Lord has opened a way of escape to us. No matter what we do we cannot save ourselves.

We sometimes say, "tomorrow." But let us not make this fatal mistake. Make your decision to no longer live in sin today. What we do not overcome will overcome us.

As servants of God we need to urgently convince people to come to Christ, to His city of refuge and be saved.



"And it came to pass in those days, that he went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God." Luke 6:12.


"And when they had ordained them elders in every church, and had prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord, on whom they believed." Acts. 14:23.

After this service the conference was closed as Br. Eaton entreated all present to make a commitment to God.



It is not possible to receive the seal of God outside the church of God, because the sealing angel is commanded to go through Jerusalem only.

Therefore, we have a message to the people to come out of Babylon.

"Go ye forth of Babylon, flee ye from the Chaldeans, with a voice of singing declare ye, tell this, utter it even to the end of the earth; say ye, The Lord hath redeemed His servant Jacob." Isa. 48:20.

"Ho, ho, come forth, and flee from the land of the north, saith the Lord: for I have spread you abroad as the four winds of heaven, saith the Lord. Deliver thyself, O Zion, that dwellest with the daughter of Babylon." Zech. 2:6, 7.

"And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, come out of her My people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues." Rev. 18:4.

"And it shall be, that whoso will not come up of all the families of the earth unto Jerusalem to worship the King, the Lord of hosts, even upon them shall be no rain." Zech. 14:17.

Clear is the message the Lord has given us. People are called to







These captives withdrew from the city to the nature. Beside the rivers of Babylon they gathered in small groups to weep and lament as they remembered Jerusalem. In their sorrow they could not sing the songs of Zion. They were homesick. The cities of Babylon did not satisfy them.

Babylon was a beautiful city. The palace of their king was twice the size of the city of Jerusalem. It covered eight miles, with hanging gardens, built on the arched terraces, each rising above the other, and rich in all the luxuriance of artificial cultivation. Their colossal temple rising eight stories high. The splendor and glory far surpassed the city of Jerusalem. Their feasts and entertainment was most attractive. The best artists in the world had been brought there. It was the center of the world.

But all this splendor and glory did not satisfy the Hebrew captives; therefore they withdrew from these cities to isolated places, shedding bitter tears in their longing for their own country.

But as the time passed, many became used to the life in Babylon. They learned their language. They built their houses and gardens. They had friends and the learned to enjoy the entertainment and luxury of Babylon. Eventually they forgot the city of their fathers and of their God. They were not homesick anymore.

Finally when the time came that they could return to their own city, only a small company was willing to go, others decided to remain in Babylon.

Don't we have the same danger today, that we may forget our God and our homeland and become used to a life here? We may feel comfortable in this world.

But, the little remnant who felt themselves strangers and pilgrims even in this magnificent city, were now rejoicing.

"When the Lord turned again the captivity of Zion, we were like

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them that dream. Then was our mouth filled with laughter, and our tongue with singing: then said they among the heathen, The Lord hath done great things for them. The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad." Ps. 126:1-3.

Now their tears had changed to gladness. What was there in Jerusalem that they could not forget? What made this city so special?

"Nor by the earth: for it is His footstool: neither by Jerusalem; for it is the city of the great King." Matt. 5:35.

"Thus saith the Lord; I am returned unto Zion, and will dwell in the midst of Jerusalem: and Jerusalem shall be called a city of truth: and the mountain of the Lord of hosts the holy mountain." Zech. 8:3

"And it shall be in that day that living waters shall go out from Jerusalem." Zech. 14:8.

"And men shall dwell in it, and there shall be no more utter destruction; but Jerusalem shall be safely inhabited." Zech. 14:11.

"As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you; and ye shall be comforted in Jerusalem." Isa. 66:13.

"But be ye glad and rejoice for ever in that which I create: for, behold, I create Jerusalem a rejoicing, and her people for joy. And I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and joy in My people: and the voice of weeping shall be no more heard in her, nor the voice of crying." Isa. 65: 18, 19.

"She coming in that instant gave thanks likewise unto the Lord, and spake of Him to all them that looked for redemption in Jerusalem." Luke 2:38.



"Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." MATTHEW 5:48

This word "perfect" has caused many discussions in the religious world. Does it entail sinlessness or does it not? Many who say it is NOT sinlessness use it as an excuse for continuing in sin.

We often hear of the need for perfection. How can a man live a perfect life? Is it possible? Is it required? What does God mean when He said perfection? Does He mean that we are to STRIVE for perfection... and so one day we will reach that ultimate goal of perfection, but we have not attained to it yet?

What is perfection? Literally the most common meaning that comes to mind is, "without a flaw." It can also have similar meanings such as, "conforming absolutely," "pure," or "unmixed (as in a colour)". So when Jesus said in Mat. 5:48 "Be ye therefore prefect." (Speaking in the present tense), He was indicating that His followers should be "without a flaw." How can this be?

As a noun, the word "perfect" indicates that the person or object has attained that state of flawlessness.

The word "perfect" can also be used as a verb, with a slightly different meaning or understanding. It is a process. If you are going to perfect something, you are in the process of bringing it to completion, or making it flawless. It is not necessarily in the flawless state yet at the present time. Perhaps you are trying to perfect a piece of music, so you practice it over and over again until you attain your goal of playing it without a flaw. Or you are trying to perfect a piece of pottery into a pot. You carefully shape it and mould it until it reaches the desired perfect state.

Is this not what God is trying to do for us? Perfecting our character? Can this be done by sitting back and letting the skilful Masterworker do all the work?

How can the musician perfect a piece of music if the instrument is





And he carried me away in the Spirit to a great and high nountain, and showed me the great city, the holy Gerusale lescending out of heaven from God, having the glory of God. Her light was like a most precious stone, like a jasper stone lear as crystal.

We are citizens of different countries and live in cities and towns that are not our real home places. In this world, we are pilgrims and strangers, waiting to enter our permanent home that is different than any city or town here.

There was a man of God who was looking "for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." Heb. 11:10.

But even in this world of sin, God has provided a spiritual city where sinners can enter and find redemption. Jerusalem was the city of God.

Daniel was a man in a high position, a prime minister of the world kingdom of Babylon. He lived in a palace, surrounded by servants, luxuries, and riches. But was he satisfied with the glory and honour in Babylon? Three times a day he prayed with a loud voice at the open window toward Jerusalem.

The great magnificent city of Babylon did not attract him, his heart was in the city of his fathers, in the city of his God, which at that time lay in ruins. The temple was burned and the walls broken down. Yet there was something that the great city of Babylon could not offer.

How did the captive people of Israel feel living in Babylon. We read of their experience, "By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat down, yea, we wept, when we remembered Zion. We hanged our harps upon the willows in the midst thereof. For they that carried us away captive required of us a song; and they that wasted us required of us mirth, saying, Sing us one of the songs of Zion. How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land? If I forget thee, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning. If I do not remember thee, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth; if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy." Ps. 137:1-6.

In order to be perfect we must have our hand firmly in the hand of Christ allowing Him to abide in us. Then He will place His robe of righteousness around us hiding our filthy rags.

"Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which *is perfect* is come, then that which is in part shall be done away." 1 Cor. 13:8-10 This is perfection. It is not a perfect understanding of prophecy, or tongues, or knowledge for they shall vanish away, but it is perfect love. It is only by a love relationship with Christ that will produce this perfection of character that is expected of God's children.

"There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made *perfect in love*." 1 John 4:18

It is my hope that this article will shed a little light on the word "Perfect." It is not something to fear; nor is it not something to boast about. It is a reality that is possible for a person "in Christ" but the person themselves will be unaware of it. They see themselves as sinners. They will say as did Paul, "that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief." 1 Tim. 1:15. Yet to God they have a perfect character because He can only see the robe of Christ's righteousness that is surrounding them. And we can all have it here and now.

Let us determine as did David, "I will behave myself wisely in a perfect way. O when wilt thou come unto me? I will walk within my house with a perfect heart." Ps. 101:2. *Amen*

PERFECTION OF PHARISEES

In Mat. 5:48, the word "perfect" is used as a noun indicating that God is asking us to BE perfect NOW. Can we do this on our own? The Pharisees though they had attained perfection. Listen to one Pharisees' prayer. "The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men [are], extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this publican. I fast twice in the week, I give tithes of all that I possess." Luke 18:11,12. Did not the Pharisees keep the Ceremonial Law perfectly? Yes, we could say they did, but were they perfect? No.

"The kingdom of God cometh not with observation:" Luke 17:20 (Marginal reading for the word 'observation' is 'outward show'). The Pharisees did plenty for outward show, but Jesus called them "whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead men's bones, and of all uncleanness." Matt. 23:27.

The Jews were wearily toiling to become righteous by their own works. They had a very legal religion and they paid careful attention to every minute detail of the letter of the law, losing sight completely of the spirit of the law. They had made the law an end to itself, something to be kept for its own sake and had forgotten its purpose, to lift one's gaze to the high ideals of God and the self-sacrificing love that was expected towards their fellow men. The Jewish leaders taught that righteousness consisted of having an excess of good deeds over evil deeds credited to one's account in heaven. This did not result in perfection.

PERFECT IN SIN?

If we have sin in our lives are we perfect? No, we are not. Who then is without sin? "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory

of God." Rom. 3:23. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." 1 John 1:8. "For there is not a just man upon earth, that doeth good, and sinneth not." Eccl. 7:20

How can we say we are perfect if we have sin? So here is the dilemma, Jesus says "Be perfect." But the Bible also says, that if we say we have no sin we have not the truth.

Mat. 5:48 is the most well-known verse at the centre of this dilemma. While many know it by memory, it says, "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect."

WHAT DOES JESUS MEAN WHEN HE SAYS PERFECT HERE?

The Greek word used in Mat. 5:48 for "perfect" is *telios*. In Greek this literally means, "one who has reached the goal," or "complete." It comes from the root word *telos*, which means "end," "fulfillment" "completion" or "limit".

In Greek literature it is used to denote a flawless sacrifice, of full-grown mature animals. It also is used to mean physically and intellectually mature adult human beings, (fully qualified or trained professionals). Could it imply that we have grown into mature Christians and are no longer babes in Christ?

Paul speaks in 1 Cor. 2:6 of "them that are perfect", indicating that there are people who were considered perfect. He speaks wisdom to them.

In Phil. 3:15 Paul again talks of those that are perfect. "Let us therefore, as many as are perfect, be thus minded:"

Yet, Paul was also aware of the fact that there were new heights to be reached and that he himself had not reached them. "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Phil 3:13, 14. And then he

goes on to say, that as many as are perfect should be thus minded.

GOD'S IDEAL

"The greatest Teacher the world has ever known is Jesus Christ; and what is the standard He has given for all who believe in Him? [Mat 5:48 quoted] "As God is perfect in His high sphere of action, so man may be perfect in his human sphere." CT 365

"God's ideal for His children is higher than the highest human thought can reach. [Matt. 5:48 quoted]. This command is a promise. The plan of redemption contemplates our complete recovery from the power of Satan. Christ always separates the contrite soul from sin. He came to destroy the works of the devil, and He has made provision that the Holy Spirit shall be imparted to every repentant soul. *to keep him from sinning*." DA 311

If we are connected to Jesus and have the Holy Spirit to direct and quide us, will we sin?

"The *tempter's agency is not to be accounted an excuse for one wrong act*. Satan is jubilant when he hears the professed followers of Christ making excuses for their deformity of character. It is these excuses that lead to sin. *There is no excuse for sinning.* A holy temper, a Christlike life, is accessible to every repenting, believing child of God." DA 311

"Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you." 2 Cor. 13:11 Do we say, "be perfect" when we say farewell? Paul did.

"PERFECT" EXAMPLES IN THE BIBLE

The Bible has recorded many instances where men were considered perfect. i.e. "Noah was a just man and perfect in his generations, and Noah walked with God." Genesis 6:9

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"Asa's heart was perfect with the LORD all his days." 1 kings 15:14

"There was a man in the land of Uz, whose name was **Job**; and that man was perfect and upright, and one that feared God, and eschewed evil." Job 1:1

Even the "**men of war**, that could keep rank, came with a perfect heart to Hebron." 1 Chron. 2:38

There are also many verses where God encourages His people to **BE** perfect.

Abraham was told, "I [am] the Almighty God; walk before me, and **be** thou perfect." Gen. 17:1

"Thou shalt be perfect with the LORD thy God." Deut.18:13

"Let your heart therefore **be perfect** with the LORD our God, to walk in his statutes, and to keep his commandments, as at this day." 1 Kings 8:61

David encouraged his son Solomon to "serve him with *a perfect heart* and with a willing mind." 1 Chron. 28:9.

PERFECTION NOW?

How can we have perfection now? Please read this following paragraph slowly and carefully. Read it several times if need be so that you will not forget it when you reach the end of the article.

"Our Saviour does not require impossibilities of any soul. He expects nothing of His disciples that He is not willing to give them grace and strength to perform. He would not call upon them to be perfect if He had not at His command every perfection of grace to bestow on the ones upon whom He would confer so high and holy a privilege..." {AG 230.4}

There is something we must do. "Our work is to strive to attain

good works." 2 Tim 3:16, 17

3) Perfect through suffering and weakness

"For it became him, for whom are all things, and by whom are all things, in bringing many sons unto glory, to make the captain of their salvation *perfect through sufferings*." Heb. 2:10. Although suffering is not something we choose to do, the important point is to not complain during your trials. They are God's means of perfecting your character.

"But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." 1 Pet. 5:10

"And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for *my strength is made perfect in weakness*. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me." 2 Cor. 12:9

4) Gifts to church for perfecting of saints

"Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ:" Eph. 4:13. Use your gifts and talents wisely, for the honour and glory of God.

5) One step at a time

"A well-balanced character is formed by single acts well performed. **One defect**, cultivated instead of being overcome, makes the man imperfect, and closes against him the gate of the Holy City... In all the redeemed host **not one defect** will be seen." FLB 44

6) Faith AND works

Yet we know that "faith, if it hath not works, is dead." James 2:17. If a person is "in Christ" the works come automatically. "Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect?" James 2:22. The perfect combination of faith and works is seen in the perfect man.

RESULTS OF PERFECTION

Peace: "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright: for the end of that man is peace. Psalm 37:37. It is the perfect man that has found peace.

Guidance: Perfect people will receive guidance from the Lord. "The righteousness of the perfect shall direct his way: but the wicked shall fall by his own wickedness." Prov. 11:5

Success: "Perfection, holiness, nothing short of this, would give them success in carrying out the principles He had given them." 2T 445

"If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able also to bridle the whole body." James 3:2. This verse portrays the impact a person's words can have. A person who does not offend in words is a perfect person and able to bridle his whole body. How careful we should be in the use of our words.

CONCLUSION:

"The ideal of Christian character is Christlikeness. As the Son of man was perfect in His life, so His followers are to be perfect in their life. Jesus was in all things made like unto His brethren. He became flesh, even as we are. He was hungry and thirsty and weary. He was sustained by food and refreshed by sleep. He shared the lot of man; yet He was the blameless Son of God. He was God in the flesh. His character is to be ours...

"Christ is the ladder that Jacob saw, the base resting on the earth, and the topmost round reaching to the gate of heaven, to the very threshold of glory. If that ladder had failed by a single step of reaching the earth, we should have been lost. But Christ reaches us where we are. He took our nature and overcame, that we through taking His nature might overcome. Made 'in the likeness of sinful flesh' (Romans 8:3), He lived a sinless life. Now by His divinity He lays hold upon the throne of heaven, while by His humanity He reaches us. He bids us by faith in Him attain to the glory of the



We shall have Christlike sympathy for all souls, both saints and sinners; but with this experience there will be no vain boasting of our sinlessness." ST, May 23, 1895 par. 7

Of Lucifer it was said, "Thou wast perfect in thy ways from the day that thou wast created, till iniquity was found in thee." Ezekiel 28:15 Lucifer was perfect until when? Until iniquity was found in him. This clearly indicates that perfection is a state of the absence of sin. But we still have a sinful human nature that has a daily battle between the flesh and the spirit.

HOW TO ATTAIN PERFECTION

Jesus was perfect while on earth, but He had no advantage over us. "Jesus revealed no qualities, and exercised no powers, that men may not have through faith in Him. His perfect humanity is that which all His followers may possess, if they will be in subjection to God as He was." AG 230

Christ in you, the hope of glory:" Col 1:27 "How can we reach the perfection specified by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ--our Great Teacher? Can we meet His requirement and attain to so lofty a standard? We can, else Christ would not have enjoined us to do so. He is our righteousness. In His humanity He has gone before us and wrought out for us perfection of character. We are to have the faith in Him that works by love and purifies the soul. *Perfection of* character is based upon that which Christ is to us. If we have constant dependence on the merits of our Saviour, and walk in His footsteps, we shall be like Him, pure and undefiled." TMK 130

"Whom we preach, warning every man, and teaching every man in all wisdom; that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus:" Col.1:28. The key words in this verse is, "In Christ Jesus." We can be perfect "in Christ". Without Christ it is an impossibility. We cannot even repent without Christ.

This is the only way to obtain perfection. "I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know

that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved

"God is my strength and power: And he maketh my way perfect." 2 Sam. 22:33.

If Christ is "in you", then you will be shown how to obtain perfection.

"When God gave His Son to the world, He made it possible for men and women to be perfect by the use of every capability of their beings to the glory of God. In Christ He gave to them the riches of His grace, and a knowledge of His will. As they would empty themselves of self, and learn to walk in humility, leaning on God for guidance, men would be enabled to fulfill God's high purpose for them." AG 230

This last sentence gives us an indication as to how this perfection is possible. 1) Empty themselves of self, 2) learn to walk in humility, 3) leaning on God for guidance. Following these steps will certainly result in perfection of character. Here are a few other directives.

1) Surrender all to Christ

The rich young ruler wanted to be perfect, and this was Jesus answer to his inquiry. "Jesus said unto him, If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven; and come and follow me." Mat. 19:21. Is this a requirement for us to do likewise? No, not necessarily, but we must not be in so much love with our material possessions that we cannot give them up for Christ if it was required of us. All our material goods are lent to us from God. We are stewards of our means and possessions and they are to be used wisely for the kingdom of God.

2) Made perfect... through Bible reading

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all

in our sphere of action the perfection that Christ in His life on the earth attained in every phase of character. He is our example. In all things we are to strive to honour God in character... We are to be wholly dependent on the power that He has promised to give BUT... us." AG 230

"It is our lifework to be reaching forward to the perfection of Christian character, striving continually for conformity to the will of God. The efforts begun upon earth will continue through eternity." 4T 520

SINLESSNESS

Is this perfection sinlessness? Is this the expectation of God? Although we read in the Bible, "there are none righteous" and we are told to "be perfect" what about those who claim to "be perfect" or "sinless"? Have they reached the standard of perfection in their

"Let those who feel inclined to make a high profession of holiness look into the mirror of God's law. As they see its far-reaching claims, and understand its work as a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart, they will not boast of sinlessness. 'If we,' says John, not separating himself from his brethren, 'say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." AA 562

"It is evident that where a claim to sinlessness is made. there the law of God has not been written in the heart; for the commandments of God are exceeding broad, and are discerners of the thoughts and intents of the heart." ST APRIL 30, 1896

"Only Those Far From Christ Claim Sinlessness. -- Why is it that so many claim to be holy and sinless? It is because they are so far from Christ. I have never dared to claim any such a thing. From the time that I was 14 years old, if I knew what the will of God was, I was willing to do it. You never have heard me say I am sinless. Those that get sight of the loveliness and exalted character of Jesus Christ, who was holy and lifted up and His train fills the

temple, will never say it. Yet we are to meet with those that will say such things more and more." 3SM 354

"Everyone who by faith obeys God's commandments will reach the condition of sinlessness in which Adam lived before his transgression." HP 146

"Christ has made every provision for the sanctification of His church. He has made abundant provision for every soul to have such grace and strength that he will be more than a conqueror in the warfare against sin. The Saviour is wounded afresh and put to open shame when His people pay no heed to His word. He came to this world and lived a sinless life, that in His power His people might also lead lives of sinlessness. He desires them by practicing the principles of truth to show to the world that God's grace has power to sanctify the heart." RH, April 1, 1902

HOWEVER...

"The closer you come to Jesus, the more faulty you will appear in your own eyes; for your vision will be clearer, and your imperfections will be seen in distinct contrast with his perfect character." BEcho, December 1, 1892 par. 5. "And the less shall we feel like exalting ourselves." AA561

Those who ARE sinless, make no such claims. They see only their own sinFULness in comparison to Christ's righteousness. Those who CLAIM sinLESSness, are the furthest away from Christ.

If you feel sinless, you need to come closer to Christ.

"If we are doers of the word of God, we shall be followers of Christ. and our lives will be characterized by holiness in aim, holiness in aspiration, holiness in action, which is progressive sanctification.
